Commissary shows off new look

Store celebrates grand reopening after renovations

After 13 months of renovations, the Sheppard commissary officially reopened on June 18.

On hand for the event was Brig. Gen. Arthur Rooney, 82nd Training Wing commander, Mrs. Helen Rooney and Mr. Ronald Clark, Defense Commissary Agency Midwest Region director.

In his remarks, Mr. Clark touted the importance of the commissary as a military benefit and the 30 percent savings experienced by commissary shoppers.

"The average family of four realizes a savings of \$2,400 per year," said Mr. Clark. "Don't take this benefit for granted."

Renovations included replacing all refrigeration units and upgrading to modern, upright freezers. New lights, flooring and air conditioning rounded out the project.

"The \$4.8 million dollar project was paid for using funds from the 5 percent surcharge paid by Sheppard commissary shoppers," said Mr. Mike Cox, Sheppard commissary director. "No taxpayer's dollars were used in the project."

More than 1,900 shoppers took advantage of the over 1,000 sale items available during the event.

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Basketball goals crowd sidewalks

Question: I'm a base housing resident and I'm concerned about people leaving basketball goals on the sidewalks. Children can't ride their bikes on the sidewalks because the goals are blocking the way. My children are not allowed to ride in the street and they do not have fun riding because they can't ride very far. What can be done to resolve this issue?

Answer: This is an especially tough problem for those in Bunker Hill because of the limited driveway area, but I agree that the basketball goals should not be set on the sidewalks. Because of the limited area, it may be that some of the occupants will not be able to have the basketball goals at their houses. We will remind occupants not to set the goals on the sidewalks and follow up with notices when required. Also, notices have been published in the Base Bulletin and *Sheppard Senator* saying basketball goals are not allowed to be placed on sidewalks. While it is much safer for kids to stay out of the street, the sidewalk is made for

pedestrians only. Anything on the sidewalk is hazardous to pedestrians. All items should be removed and inexperienced children riding bikes should be supervised and stay in the driveway or be supervised in vacant parking lots until they are proficient and old enough to ride in the street.

Children play in streets

Question: I live in Capehart and would like to voice a concern about children playing in the streets. This seems like a tragedy waiting to happen. I've personally seen children as young as 4 or 5 years old playing recklessly and nearly getting struck by passing vehicles.

Children are often oblivious to the potential dangers that surround them in everyday life, but the parents and guardians know better! It seems more and more that the streets in certain areas of housing have become playgrounds. I believe that the adults in our community need to take note of just where their children are playing and consider the risks involved. Getting struck by a vehicle traveling at just 20 mph can still be deadly. What is the base's policy on this

matter and what could possibly be done to make our streets safer?

Answer: The concern of children playing in the streets is addressed weekly by the wing safety staff during the base newcomers traffic safety briefing, which is a mandatory briefing for all military and civilian employee personnel. It is stressed that motorists need to be alert for children at all times when driving in the housing areas. Parents are also reminded that it is their responsibility to keep an eye on their children at all times. When children are seen committing unsafe acts, all adults should intercede immediately and follow up by discussing the incident with the parents. The specific issue addressing children playing in the streets in housing is an ongoing concern and is publicized periodically by the safety office with submissions to the base paper. A safety corner article on this particular subject was published in the March 21 issue of the *Sheppard Senator* and will be published again in the near future. This topic is also included in a summer safety segment of the June episode of Sheppard Today, Channel 14,

TSTV. In addition, the folks at family advocacy have developed a child supervision policy that outlines the recommendations for parents and adults who supervise children. It states that any children age 4 or younger should not be left alone at any time. For children ages 5-6, outside play is limited to playgrounds or yards with immediate supervision, which is visual sight or hearing distance to adult supervision. For children ages 7-8, the recommendation is to have access to adult supervision when outside. Further recommendations state that children age 8 and younger are not allowed to be left alone at home at any time or left unattended in a car. Children age 9-11 can be left without a sitter in quarters for up to 4 hours but must have ready access to an adult (phone number). As always, every parent and adult needs to be alert and is expected to make an educated and informed decision regarding child supervision. Education and assistance is available through many agencies on base, to include the family advocacy program, the youth center, and the family support center. Thanks again for your interest in the safety of Sheppard family members.

ENJJPT Class 03-06 graduates 28 pilots

Twenty-eight pilots will graduate from the 80th Flying Training Wing's Euro-NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training program during ceremonies tonight at 7 p.m. at the base theater.

ENJJPT trains undergraduate pilots for nine NATO countries: Belgium, Denmark, Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, Norway, Spain, Turkey and the United States. In addition to these countries, Canada, Greece, Portugal and the United Kingdom provide flight instructors for the program.

Approximately 250 pilots complete the 55-week training program each year. Today's graduation of ENJJPT Class 03-06 includes 14 pilots from the United States, 10 from Italy and four from Germany.

German Maj. Gen. Klaus-Peter Stieglitz, 3rd German Air Division commander, is the guest speaker for tonight's graduation. The general is a command pilot with almost 3,500 flying hours in four different types of aircraft. He was decorated with the Gold Cross of Honour of the Bundeswehr.





Sheppard member to play in professional dart tournament

A Team Sheppard member has been selected to compete in a professional dart tournament in Las Vegas.

Senior Master Sgt. Holly Dye, Sheppard Air National Guard liaison, is one of four ladies selected to represent the American Darters Association at the Las Vegas Desert Classic II professional dart tournament, to be held Tuesday through July 6.

"To compete against professional dart players from around the world is such an honor, and quite a surprise," said Sergeant Dye. "The ADA has so many outstanding dart players."

Sergeant Dye has been playing steel darts for six years and began league play four years ago.

"I started playing darts as a way to socialize," said Sergeant Dye. "Some friends were playing on a team and they asked if I would like to give it a try. I joined their team and ended up as one of their top players."

The Desert Classic II is hosted by the Professional Dart Corporation. Headquartered in England, the PDC is the world's premier dart association. It represents professional dart players around the world and hosts over 50 major tournaments.

As a way to promote steel tip darts in the

United States, the PDC invited the ADA to participate in this major event.

In doing so they opened 10 men slots and four women slots for the top ADA players.

Sergeant Dye is no stranger to tournament play in Las Vegas. She was a member of a Sheppard team that competed there in the Military Cup Challenge at the 2002 American Darters Association national championships.

Team Sheppard won the Military Cup and players were then invited to participate in the ADA National Championships. Sergeant Dye competed against the best players in the ADA, placing third in the women's singles event and second in the doubles.

Sergeant Dye, and the Desert Classic II tournament, will receive live national coverage as Fox Sports World is scheduled to televise the event from its opening on Thursday to the championships on July 6.

"Competing on a professional level in front of an audience will be a test of my nerves," said Sergeant Dye. "I hope to keep calm under pressure, and if I happen to make it into the top spots on national television, then at least I know my friends and family will be cheering for me."

If Sergeant Dye finishes in the top eight, she will automatically become a member of the prestigious PDC, as well as being one of the top female American dart players.


This necessary process will

Tip of the Week - Hot vehicles unsafe

The National SAFE KIDS Campaign and General Motors have released alarming new research that shows humidity makes a hot, closed vehicle even more dangerous to young children trapped inside. The findings, which come just as temperatures are heating up across the nation, provide additional evidence that children should never be left alone in or allowed access to parked vehicles, according to GM and SAFE KIDS executives.

On the average, at least 25 children die each year as the result of being trapped in hot vehicles. Since 1996, GM has identified at least 175 deaths.

Prior research and real-world incidents have demonstrated that on a warm, sunny day, even at temperatures as mild as 60 degrees Fahrenheit, a closed vehicle can heat up to dangerous levels in minutes, and children left in this environment can face serious injury or even death.

The new study, commissioned by GM of Canada, is the second phase of tests on how heat in closed vehicles affects

infants and small children. The first phase, conducted and released in 2001, focused on dry heat and showed that the temperature within a closed vehicle can become dangerous to small children and infants in only minutes. Substituting humid heat for dry heat in the second research phase reduced that window of time by about half because the presence of additional water vapor in the air further diminishes the body's ability to get rid of heat.

BOTTOM LINE: Don't leave your children alone in a vehicle...not even for a minute!

Our drinking water meets or exceeds all federal drinking water requirements

This report is a summary of the quality of the water we provide to our customers. The analysis was made by using the data from the most recent US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) required tests and is presented in the attached pages. We hope this information helps you become more knowledgeable

able about what's in your drinking water. Where Do We Get Our Drinking Water?

Sheppard purchases its water from the City of Wichita Falls. The City of Wichita Falls purifies water from Lake Arrowhead and Lake Kickapoo. Surface water is used exclusively to provide our water. The Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission reviews all of the Texas drinking water sources. It is important to protect your drinking water by protecting your water source.

Because we purchase our water from the City of Wichita Falls, the City of Wichita Falls is responsible for most of the water quality monitoring. At Sheppard, we monitor using EPA-approved methods for lead, copper, and fecal coliform. Lead and copper are evaluated once every 3 years and coliform is monitored weekly.

ALL drinking water may contain contaminants

When drinking water meets federal standards, there may not be any health-based benefits to purchasing bottled water or point-of-use devices. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. About the following pages

The pages that follow list all of the federally regulated or monitored constituents that have been found in your drinking water. USEPA requires water systems to test up to 97 constituents.

Secondary constituents

The taste and odor constituents are called secondary constituents and are regulated by the State of Texas, not USEPA. These constituents are not causes for health concerns. Turbidity

Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can interfere with disinfection and provide a medium for microbial growth. Turbidity may indicate the presence of disease-causing organisms. These organisms include bacteria, viruses, and parasites that can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea, and associated headaches.

Coliforms

What are coliforms?

Total coliform bacteria are used as indicators of microbial contamination of drinking water because testing for them is easy. While not disease-causing organisms themselves, they are often found in association with other microbes that are capable of causing disease.

Coliform bacteria are more hardy than many disease-causing organisms; therefore, their absence from water is a good indication that the water is microbiologically safe for human consumption.

Fecal coliform bacteria and, in particular, E. coli, are members of the coliform bacteria group originating in the intestinal tract of warm-blooded animals and are passed into the environment through feces.

The presence of fecal coliform bacteria (E. coli) in drinking water may indicate recent contamination of the drinking water with fecal material.

The following table indicates whether total coliform or fecal coliform bacteria were found in the monthly drinking water samples submitted for testing by your water supplier last year.
